- I. **ASK US** at refdesk@rio.edu for help with resources and services in Davis Library by emailing both Reference Librarians simultaneously: Tim Snow, Reference Librarian, Phone: 740-245-7344, tsnow@rio.edu; Amy Wilson, Reference Outreach Specialist, Phone: 740-245-7382, awilson@rio.edu. Call Toll Free in OH, WV, KY, PA: 800-282-7201.

Chat With a Librarian – Look for the “Help” links on many OhioLINK Databases where you can talk live with a professional librarian within the state of Ohio during typical library hours. Use this service as an alternative to the above refdesk@rio.edu email help option.

- II. **RIOLINK** (<http://library.rio.edu>) - Davis Library's Homepage and library network is a collection of different databases and services including RioCat, the online listing of materials owned by Davis Library. RioLINK also serves as the gateway to OhioLINK, a network of Ohio university libraries and information resources. Most OhioLINK databases are available on your home computer via the Internet. To access these databases off campus: Your Barcode or Username is simply an “S” followed by your six-digit Student ID Number (Example: S123456). Your PIN is the last four digits of your Social Security Number (Example: 6789).

- III. **"Check It Out! Tutorial"** - A tutorial for beginning RioLINK users, this teaches basic search skills using examples from both RioCat and OhioLINK Databases. Approximately 15-30 minutes are needed to complete the entire tutorial. Mini-tutorials also available here.

IV. ACCESS TO BOOKS, MEDIA, AND OTHER MATERIALS

- A. **RioCat** - An automated database that lists the books and other materials owned by Davis Library including the Library's circulating collection on the Second Floor. *To access RioCat from Davis Library's Homepage: Click on the “RioCat” side of the Navigational Cube found in the upper left hand corner; Click on Go to Library Catalog.*

VIEW YOUR OWN LIBRARY RECORD – This feature in the RioCat Database allows you to renew and keep track of your library materials from anywhere. When ordering books from OhioLINK's Library Catalog, “OhioLINK Rec'd” indicates that your books are ready for you to pick up from Davis Library's Circulation Desk.

F. [OhioLINK Library Catalog](#) - This lists the books and other materials owned by over 80 OhioLINK Member Libraries and may be ordered online by Rio students, faculty, and staff. *To access OhioLINK's Library Catalog from Davis Library's Homepage: Click on the OhioLINK icon on the left side of the computer screen; Click on the phrase "[The OhioLINK Library Catalog](#)".*

To access the delivery service click on "Request Item" in a full citation. Follow the prompts carefully. Your "University ID Number", is simply an "S" followed by your Student ID Number (Example: S123456). Generally it takes two to three working days for books to be ready at Davis Library's Circulation Desk. No notice of availability will be sent. Students may have books for three weeks and renew the book once for an additional three weeks. Charges will

be levied for overdue or lost books.

- G. [WorldCat](#) - This OhioLINK database lists millions of records describing the materials in libraries around the world that may be ordered through traditional Interlibrary Loan. *To access [WorldCat](#) from Davis Library's Homepage: Click on the OhioLINK icon on the left-side of the computer screen; Point to the phrase "[By Name](#)"; Click the letter "[W](#)"; Click on "[WorldCat](#)".*
- H. [Interlibrary Loan Service for Books](#) - Books not owned by Davis Library or available through OhioLINK's [Library Catalog](#) may be obtained through the traditional interlibrary loan services. It takes one to two weeks to receive books through interlibrary loan and there may be a charge.
- I. [Electronic Reference Books \(ABC/CLIO\)](#) - Encyclopedias, dictionaries, and other quick-answer resources including hundreds full text reference books. *To access from Davis Library's Homepage: Click on the OhioLINK icon on the left-side of the computer screen; Point to the phrase "[By Name](#)"; Click the letter "[E](#)"; Click on "[Electronic Reference Books](#)".*
- J. [Oxford Reference Online](#) - 100 dictionary, language reference, and subject reference works. *To access from Davis Library's Homepage: Click on the OhioLINK icon on the left-side of the computer screen; Point to the phrase "[By Name](#)"; Click the letter "[O](#)"; Click on "[Oxford](#)".*

V. ACCESS TO ARTICLES IN PERIODICALS, MAGAZINES, AND JOURNALS

- A. [Academic Search Premier](#) - The world's largest scholarly, multi-discipline, full text database designed specifically for academic institutions.

To access [Academic Search Premier \(ASP\)](#) from Davis Library's Homepage: Scroll down the page and click on the OhioLINK icon on the left-side of the computer screen; Point to the phrase "[By Name](#)"; Click the letter "[A](#)"; Click on "[Academic Search Premier](#)".

1. Basic vs. Advanced Searches - [ASP](#) defaults into the "Basic Search" Mode for simple searching but users may want to chose "Advanced Search" for more search options and to fully manipulate and control search terms in the "Search History" file.
2. Limiting Results
 - a. "Full Text" – Not everything in ASP is full text. Click this box to limit to full text.
 - b. "Scholarly (Peer Reviewed) Journals" - Some instructors will not accept articles from "magazines" such as [Newsweek](#), [National Geographic](#), etc. because they are not from "professional journals". Click this box to limit results to peer reviewed journal articles.
3. Different Types of Full Text Articles
 - a. PDF Full Text – Will open up the Adobe Acrobat Reader and will include the article and any illustrations or graphics.

- b. HTML Full Text – Is generally quicker and easier to use but does not include illustrations.
4. Articles Not available In Full Text – If “Full Text” does not appear in the full citation:
- a. Click “[Find a copy](#)” to determine if Davis Library subscribes to the periodical that contains the article. If Rio Grande is listed at the top of the screen see what the library has and how it is stored. Davis Library does not own the periodical if Rio is not listed or the phrase “No print holdings found” appears.
 - b. [POP](#) - The [Print-Out of Periodicals \(POP\)](#) may also be used to determine whether Davis Library has a periodical and how older issues are stored. This is an alternative to the built-in “[Find a copy](#)” feature. Read the first page of the [POP](#) for instructions.
 - c. How periodicals are stored in Davis Library – Generally:
 - 1) Current periodicals (within a year) are available at the Circulation Desk.
 - 2) Microfilm and Microfiche are on the Main Floor and paper copies may be made.
 - 3) Periodicals bound in “Paper” are located on the Ground Floor.
5. [Interlibrary Loan Service for Articles](#) – Articles from periodicals not owned by Davis Library or available full-text online may be ordered through traditional Interlibrary Loan. It takes one to two weeks to receive articles and there may be a charge.

B. Other Appalachia Relevant OhioLINK Databases:

- 1. [America: History and Life](#) is a comprehensive bibliography of articles on the history and culture of the United States and Canada from prehistory to the present. AHL offers abstracts and citations for articles appearing in over 2,000 journals published worldwide in history, related humanities, and the social sciences.
- 2. [American Periodicals Series Online](#) contains page images of more than 1,100 historic American magazines, journals, and newspapers. These resources illuminate the development of American culture, politics, and society across some 150 years. Articles can be searched by author, source, and words in the complete text.
- 3. [Annals of American History](#) Full text of over 2000 primary documents in American history, including: historical accounts, speeches, memoirs, poems, editorials, and cultural criticism. Also has multimedia files including more than 500 pictures, hundreds of video clips, and audio of famous speeches.
- 4. [Arts and Humanities Citation Index \(ISI\)](#) is a multidisciplinary database covering the journal literature of the arts and humanities. It indexes 1,144 of the world's leading arts and humanities journals, as well as covering individually selected, relevant items from

over 6,800 major science and social science journals.

5. [Dissertation Abstracts \(ProQuest Dissertations & Theses\)](#) contains more than 2 million entries for doctoral dissertations and master's theses. The database includes citations for materials ranging from the first U.S. dissertation, accepted in 1861, to those accepted as recently as last semester. Since 1997, new publications have been available electronically, and many publications can be ordered through the system for a fee. S1:405
